<u>Thursday</u> 26th September, by <u>Zoom</u> lan Mason: Treasures of Ramsey Abbey

Ramsey Abbey was one of the great monasteries of medieval England. Although there are few building remains besides the gatehouse and infirmary (now the parish church) there are significant other artifacts, notably the censer (illustrated) and incense boat that once adorned the high altar of the abbey church. Goodliff Awards Presentation Evening

Once again, an amazing variety of projects, popular and academic, spanning many centuries, types of history, covering the length and breadth of Huntingdonshire. Come to hear and see about the successful projects and congratulate the successful applicants. Refreshments.

Our President, Julie Montagu, Viscountess Hinchingbrooke, will present the awards. Afterwards she will give us some update on her researches into on a previous American member of the family, under the title:

The Unknown American Heiress, Alberta Sturges, 9th Countess of Sandwich

Julie writes: In the gilded corridors of early 20th-century high society, Alberta stands at a crossroads between societal expectations and personal enlightenment. Born into an era marked by the transatlantic marriages of American heiresses—like Consuelo Vanderbilt to the Duke of Marlborough or Helena Zimmerman to the Duke of Manchester—Alberta faces her own pressures to conform. Yet, her personal journey is one of profound introspection and spiritual discovery, influenced by her deep engagement with the teachings of Swami Vivekananda. As she corresponds with George, a potential suitor and later her husband of 46 years, her letters reflect a struggle to reconcile a life pre-ordained by social duty with a path of spiritual authenticity she yearns to follow. Alberta's story is a compelling exploration of identity. duty, and the pursuit of a life led not by societal norms, but by the guest for personal truth and spiritual integrity.

Alberta's archive of letters, journals and diaries is stored at Mapperton House, Dorset, principal home of the Montagus since 1955. Julie's research has given birth to the 'Alberta Research Project', engaging 30 volunteers worldwide formed into teams named after *White Star* liners transcribing scanned copies of the letters, 4,000 of which have now been done. The project has been distinguished by its innovative adoption of new technologies, including the creation of an 'Alberta Al' whereby she answers questions about her life. This Al technology will be a part of the presentation. In June the project was awarded the 2024 Archives and Records Association's national Archives Volunteering Award.
